THE PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

To All Alumni and Former Students of Birzeit College,

Greeting from the College to each and everyone of you, wherever you may be, coupled with hearty wishes that you may all be happy and successful in whatever work you may be doing.

It is always pleasant to reminisce about old days in school, and it is useful occasionally to compare one's actual achievement at any specific time in life, with what one had hoped and planned to achieve while he was still a student. When you do so, you will find that, whether you have done better or worse, you have certainly learned many lessons from experience which no school whatsoever could have imparted to you.

One such lesson is the extreme importance of choosing the "right" career in life; a career which falls within one's mental and physical abilities and which is capable of arousing in him maximum interest and enthusiasm. Perhaps the most valuable lesson, however, is how to turn failure into success. This you will find needs intelligent thinking and planning, but above all it requires patience, hard work, honesty and tact. In addition to these lessons experience reveals, to those whose eyes are really open, the immense pleasure one can drive from turning success into the good of the whole community or at least in making one's success in full harmony with the general good of the community.

At this point it is perhaps useful to remind you all of the two major rules in life which all educational institutions continuously impress upon their students. These rules should be strictly adhered to, regardless of the careers which you may have chosen for yourselves and regardless also of any general abjectives which you may wish to attain in life:

- 1. Devote all your mental and physical energies to your profession or vocation.
- 2. In your endeavours to achieve your ends confine the means which you employ to those which are noble and honorable.

Conformance with the first rule will make you a successful and an outstanding member of your profession; while conformance with the second will make of you a good and outstanding citizen, not only of your own country but of the whole world.

The first rule is relatively easy for it should not be difficult for the normal person, who is sufficiently motivated to become a good doctor, a good engineer, a good lawyer, or a good skilled worker in any trade or profession. Perseverance and hard work will almost invariably produce the desired result. To become a good citizen, however, is a much more complex achievement; as it involves a variety of hard ethical decisions, which often appear to contradict one's immediate interests. Honesty, humility, unselfishness, positive consideration for others, tact and contentment, without sacrificing noble ambitions are all sublime qualitities which make ethical decisions extremely hard to make. But it is only by making such hard decisions that one can become a good citizen: and it is primarily good citizenship that your College and your community expect of you.

In conclusion my brief message to you, at the close of this academic year is: Whatever you do, do with all your might; but do it always in a way which is unquestionably right.


ANNUAL SPORTS EXHIBITION


This year's exhibition included modern varieties of rhythmic exercises for boys and girls presented for the first time in Jordan.











Another world under the microscopes.

Modern woman is no more merely a kitchen instrument, sewer of buttons or iron shirts. She is truly a partner, working jointly with her husband in building a better future, raising the standard of their family and, eventually, of society in general.

Psychologically, women are regarded as superior to men in endurance and stability, and equal to them in intelligence. Therefore, there is no reason to believe that they cannot perform as well as men in most feilds-be they political economic or social.

I believe that women for these reasons should be given the opportunity to obtain higher education. There are some disadvantages, but I believe that more than outweighed by the advantages. Those who oppose this view put forward many problems, but they are, in my opinion, not very important in comparison with the benefits.

Some people claim that the educated woman will claim more of life, people and her husband, and may easily become dissatisfied. This might be true, but an ambitious woman is often a good incentive to her husband in his career. To the claim that she may dominate her husband, I would emphasize that a man with such a week personality will be dominated by any woman, whether educated or not.

A third objection is that an educated woman usually wants to work, thus neglecting her responsibilities to her home and children. That the educated woman will want to work is admitted, but this should not necessarily result in broken homes and delinquent children. On the contrary, for there is time to spare for both responsibilities, avoiding the idleness, gossip, and boredom of an inactive life at home. Also in case she is widowed, a working woman can support her children and herself.

Further, an educated man would naturally want a woman who can understand him and with whom he can discuss his problems- emotional, social or otherwise. He wants a woman he can be proud of and who share to some extent, his attitude to life and society.

Finally, an educated woman can bring her children up on sound psychological, social, and educational basis, arising out of mutual understanding between her and her husband.

SHAKIB OTAQUI-

There is no ethical or moral objection to the higher education for the gentle sex: the real difficulties arise from practical difficulties in an area such as the Middle East, where the proper adjustment for such education have not yet been made.

Firstly, the social attitude towards the employment of women graduates is still largely negative, especially if such graduates are married. And since marriage is even in this modern age-considered to be an essential goal for women (and for men for that matter) the wastage involved in keeping a large part of our greatly needy graduate stock idle in the home is unacceptable. This problem does not arise in western countries, where the employment of married women is not looked upon with such horror.

Secondly, even if married women were to find employment opportunities available, certain problems are bound to arise: Starting from the begining, the university graduates will be limited in the choice of a marriage partner, who will have to be of at least equal qualifications-anything else will really start the marriage on the wrong basis. Then the economic independence of an employed women will weaken the marriage tie by making the fear of divorce less overwhelming this trend has become increasingly disturbing in the U. S. A. and Europe. Finally, the natural by product of women children will suffer from a lack of attention, since the requisite structure of nurseries and boarding schools is not yet available in the Middle East.

Thirdly, and perhaps not so important, many girls do not continue their education due to early marriage, thus wasting scarce educational resources which an underdeveloped region like the Middle East can hardly avoid.

In conclusion, one can say that although there are no reasons of male superiority for limiting education of women, the practical difficulties involved make it undesirable to encourage it at present. A practical alternative would be to provide special courses of a cultural and general nature will promote a greater awareness of social affairs, leaving the more specialized higher education to that small percentage of women who are really dedicated to aquiring knowledge for its own sake.

The Editorial Board of this Graduation Issue has been involved, during the past year, in the production of "Al-Ghadeer". This experience has given us a new insight into the psychology of students in general, and those at Birzeit in particular. In the hope that this experience may prove helpful to anyone trying to organise any activity at Birzeit, and in the more optimistic hope that students in general may be stimulated to give more assistance to such organisers, we take this final opportunity to record our observations on the matter.

The first problem encountered in trying to produce a magazine of College standard is the amazing lack of talent at Birzeit. It seems remarkable that out of approximately two hundred students in the college, it is difficult to find a dozen who won't reply "Sorry, I can't write" when asked for contributions. We find it difficult to believe that such a lack of talent is really the case, rather than just an excuse to hide what is obviously a 'couldn't-care-less' attitude. The experience of the various Club presidents in trying to get some activity out of their members appears to reinforce this view.

Secondly, it is remarkable how such a lazy bunch of students suddenly wake up and spring to action when the magazine, due to no effort of their own, is finally ready. Their desire to offer 'helpful' criticism is quite extraordinary; until, that is, one realizes that what is being offered is negative (even destructive) criticism at its worst. They find it easy to say "Why dont you do...", but appear incapable of doing anything about it themselves.

For the benefit of those so ready with their criticism, we would like to give a brief account of the problems involved in producing a magazine like "Al-Ghadeer". Apart from having, for obvious reasons, to write most of the articles ourselves, we have to undergo the process known in journalistic circles as 'putting the baby to bed', i. e. seeing that it gets printed roughly in the way it was written-which is more difficult than one would imagine due to the quality of type-setters available. This necessitates almost daily trips to the press, and even so does not result in perfection.

We do not write this in order to get sympathy or gratitude, there is enough satisfaction in knowing that one has done a job to the best of his ability; and after all, criticism from such an obviously uninterested readership can hardly be taken to heart. But it is obvious that however hard they try, a small group can never achieve the standard desirable in a College magazine, and since we feel that Birzeit is capable of producing something better if only more people would co-operate, this editorial is an appeal for such co-operation in the future.

So, to the future editors of "Al-Ghadeer", we give our best wishes and hope that they will be able to achieve ever higher standards. And to the students who will form the next sophomore class, we hope that they will admit to higher talents than these exhibited by our generation, and do some work accordingly. In any case, we would like to say that our job, despite the frustrations inherent in it, has been enjoyable and rewarding and that relief at relinquishing it is not unmingled with regret.
